Save the Dates

Dear Friends,

What a difference a year makes! This time in 2020, the Food Bank Staff and I expected a 15% increase in pounds distributed in collaboration with the network of agencies we serve over 2020. This increase would have equated to 300,000 pounds. Well, it ended up being a 40% increase at just over 1,000,000 pounds. These pounds represent over 833,000 meals for Siouxlanders from Denison to Inwood; from Hull to Oakland. Without donors like you, the Food Bank of Siouxland staff could not continue to provide the food distribution service it does. I am so awestruck at the generosity of each donation and each donor. Siouxlanders stepped up to help their neighbors, and for that we thank you!

Many of our agency partners reported seeing new clients in 2020. These clients had never visited a food pantry and were unsure of how food pantries worked. Agencies pivoted to help those clients by changing distribution methods and/or expanding hours to serve these families. Outside drive-through models replaced indoor shopping for many agencies. Volunteers stepped in to help distribute frozen protein in the parking lots of the YMCA in South Sioux City and outside of Mercy Field. These innovations were key in meeting our community's needs.

While the vaccine is being distributed, the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic will remain through 2021. Eventually, people will feel comfortable visiting restaurants and hotels again, which will reestablish jobs that had been lost. Home building, including single family houses, townhouses, and apartments, remains strong. Planting and calving season will start as soon as fields begin to dry out. These visible signs of recovery hide the effects on individuals and families. If a household experiences even one case of a family member with COVID-19, the lost wages take time to recover. Even with stimulus checks,

food prices have remained high due to production disruptions (factory shutdowns due to outbreaks, reduced hours due to social distancing, etc.). Once a person gets behind on a bill or two, it takes time and hard work to get back ahead.

That's where the Food Bank of Siouxland comes in. We have the ability to find and store food. The agencies working with the Food Bank have the models to distribute food effectively and efficiently. In food deserts, the Food Bank has unique distribution models like the BackPack Program, which provides school children weekend food sacks. At other schools, the Food Bank supplies family oriented food boxes for children and their whole family. The Food Bank also delivers food directly for immediate distribution in other areas through our Mobile Pantry Program. This is where you come in: Keeping the hamburger meat frozen costs money. Transporting the food to Denison costs money. Operating a server for agencies' accounts costs money. The Siouxland community is going through a very hard period of time.

We can see the goal, but until we end hunger, the mission of the Food Bank continues. Your monthly and yearly donations keep our programs running.

I cannot thank you enough for what you have helped us do so far; let's continue leading Siouxland in the fight against hunger!


